Fluzaroo season has begun!

All Maury Regional Health (MRH) employees, volunteers and active medical staff can receive flu vaccine during Maury Regional Medical Center's Fluzaroo kickoff event on Oct. 4 from 7 a.m. to 2 p.m. in the Auxiliary Conference Room.

Maury Regional Medical Center (MRMC)

In addition to Fluzaroo, flu vaccinations will also be available at in the Maury Regional Occupational Health Conference Room at 1114 W 7th St. on Oct. 4 from 3 to 5 p.m. Flu shots will then be available starting Monday through Friday from 7 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. in the Employee Health office. Depending on volunteer participation, mobile flu vaccination carts will travel throughout Maury Regional Medical Center daily from Oct. 5 through Oct. 31 from 7 a.m. to 11 a.m. and 5 p.m. to 9 p.m.

Marshall Medical Center (MMC)

Flu shots will be available in Room 1 located on Same Day Surgery at MMC on Sept. 30 from 1 to 3 p.m., Oct. 1 from 8 a.m. to 3 p.m., Oct. 2 from 7:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. and Oct. 3 from 6:30 a.m. to 1 p.m.

Wayne Medical Center (WMC)

WMC had their Fluzaroo kickoff events on Sept. 16 and 23. If employees were unable to make those dates, they can go to Employee Health at WMC for their flu vaccine.

Lewis Health Center (LHC)

LHC employees can report to the East or the West Nursing Stations to receive employee flu vaccinations beginning Oct. 4.

Those receiving a vaccine at any MRH location must bring the MRH ID badge. Those who receive an FDA-approved flu vaccine at another facility, drug store pharmacy or physician's office must provide proof of vaccination to Employee Health (PeopleEH@ MauryRegional.com). Those who have an allergy or medical contraindication to the vaccine should contact Employee Health, ext. 1575, as soon as possible to discuss options.
